


Net bags are the 'new' trendy *it* item. Grandma's nets just keep catching more people as time goes by. A home for your packed lunch, running a few errands down at the (super) market, or just for fun on the beach: you won't run out of things to do with this classic. You can have this bag knitted, crocheted or knotted in your favourite colour in no time flat.

supplies



- 51 m macramé cord (Ø 5 mm):
16 cords of 3 m and 2 cords of 1.5 m

knots used



Square knot

1. Start with four cords. Use your left hand to loosely bring the right cord under the two centre-most cords (2 & 3) and over the left cord. Use your right hand to cross the left cord over the centre-most cords behind to the right cord.
2. Hold the same end of cord 1 in front of the centre-most cords and form a loop. Do this by taking the end of the 4th cord and crossing it under the centre-most cords. You should end up with 1 crossing over the centre-most cords twice, with the ends of cord 1 threaded through the loop formed by the right cord to the left of the centre-most cords. Cord 4 should still be under cords 2 and 3.
3. Gently pull the ends of cords 1 and 4 to form a knot.

Cut 16 pieces of cord, each 3 metres long.





Fold 1 piece of cord (of the 16 pieces) in half crosswise and pull the two (loose) ends of the cord together through the loop, so that you end up with a 'hoop'.




Fold the 15 other pieces of cord in half and knot these around the hoop by pulling the ends through the loop (around the hoop). Tighten these ends.

Once you've knotted all of the cords around the hoop, tighten the circle so that all the knots sit side by side.






Create a square knot for each four cords (i.e., 4 square knots). Start knotting the next row and alternate the cords so that the square knots are staggered.



Repeat until you have 8 rows.

Cut all of the remaining cord so that they're the same length. You should have about 40 cm remaining. Gather two times 2 x 8 cords together for the handles. You can braid part of the cord ends (like the beige bag) or you can simply leave the ends as they are (like the pink bag). Overlap the ends of 2 x 8 cords by approximately 10 cm. You might want to secure them with a bit of tape to make sure they stay together.

Take a piece of cord 1.5 m long and place this parallel to the direction that the cords are in. Set aside 10 cm on one side and make a loop/curve at the other side of the 'future' handle (at around 20 cm) and go back to the side with the loop. There should be at least 1 m of cord past the first 10 cm piece.

Take the longest piece and wrap the ends and the cord until you have the width of the handle you want. Pull the end of the cord (that you've wrapped around) through the loop. Pull on the other end (10 cm piece of cord), so that you tighten the cord, thus forming a knot. Snip off the ends.
