

Nemo by Fibre ⚡ood





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Net bags are the 'new' trendy *it* item. Grandma's nets just keep catching on for more people as time goes by. A home for your packed lunch, running a few errands down at the (super)market, or just for fun on the beach: you won't run out of things to do with this classic. You can have this bag knitted, crocheted or knotted in your favourite colour in no time flat.

supplies



- Yarns: 2 balls of 50 g of Gaia (Lang Yarns, colour 0048)
- Knitting needles no. 8
- Crochet hook no. 4

stitches used

Knitting:

Rib stitch 1/1: Purl 1, knit 1, repeat. For the return row, knit the stitches as they appear.

Honeycomb brioche stitch:

+ O X O X O X +

+ X O X O X O +

+ O X O X O X +

+ X O X O X O +

+ : this is a selvedge stitch, the 1st and last stitch of the row are standard knit stitches

O : yarn over

X = slip 1 knit stitch without knitting, knit the next stitch, then pass the slip stitch over the knitted stitch

Crocheting:

Chain: Yarn over hook and draw through the loop [draw up a loop]. Repeat until you've formed a chain.

Double crochet (DC): Insert the crochet hook into the next stitch, yarn over, grab it with the hook and draw up a loop. You should now have 2 loops on your crochet hook. Yarn over again, this time drawing through the 2 loops so that you only have 1 loop left.

knitting instructions



1

front and back

Cast on 25 stitches with a no 8 needle.

Knit a honeycomb brioche stitch and increase by 1 stitch every second row on both sides until you have 37 stitches. Continue knitting in honeycomb brioche stitch until you have a length of 30 cm.

Next knit in rib stitch 1/1 for 6 rows and cast off.

Knit two pieces.

2

handle

Crochet 65 chain stitches and crochet 4 rows of double crochet stitches.

3

finishing

Join the sides to each other by crocheting and sew or crochet the handle securely in place on both sides.
